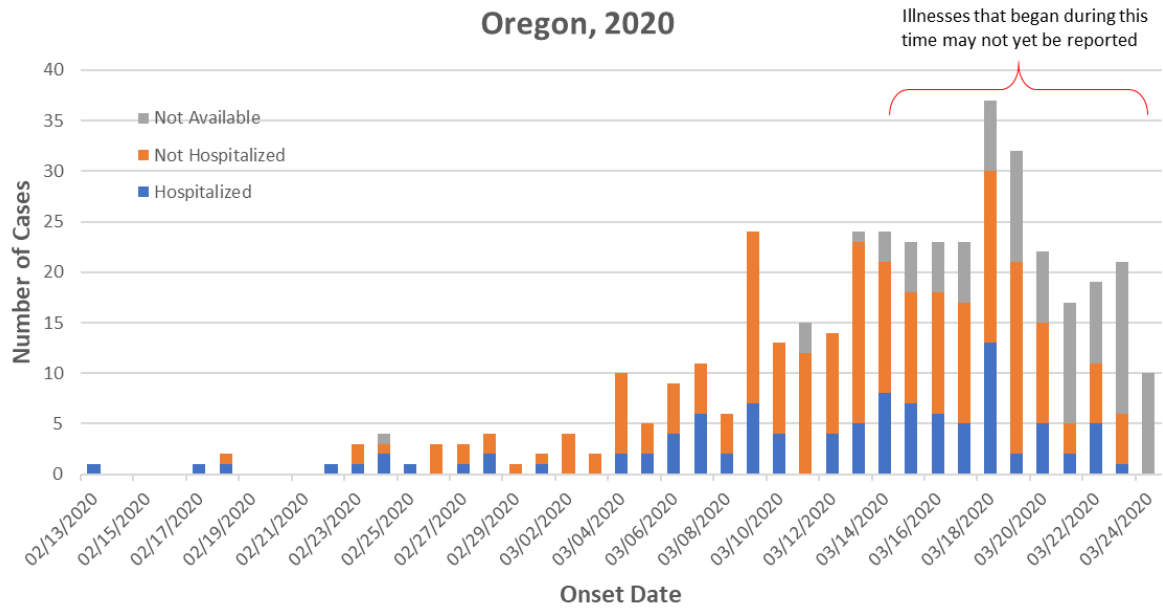

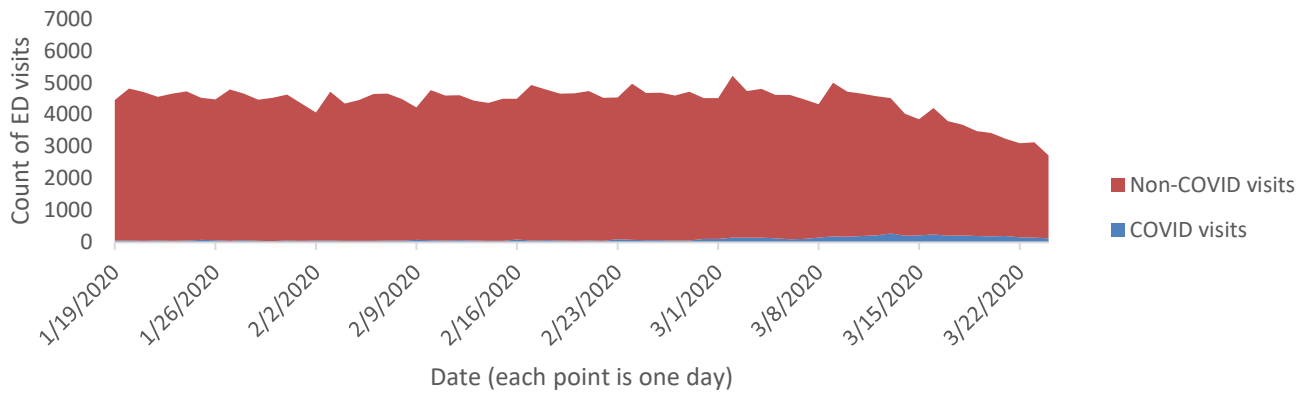

- 12 deaths reported in Oregon
 - Oregon State Public Health Laboratory (OSPHL) Testing
 - o 88 specimens were received 3/26
 - o 75 OSPHL test results were released on 3/26
 - o 44 specimens pending as of 8:30 p.m. 3/26
 - o 1,942* total persons have been tested for COVID-19 at OSPHL since 2/28
- *Data reconciliation resulted in a larger than usual increase in the cumulative number of persons tested by OSPHL.

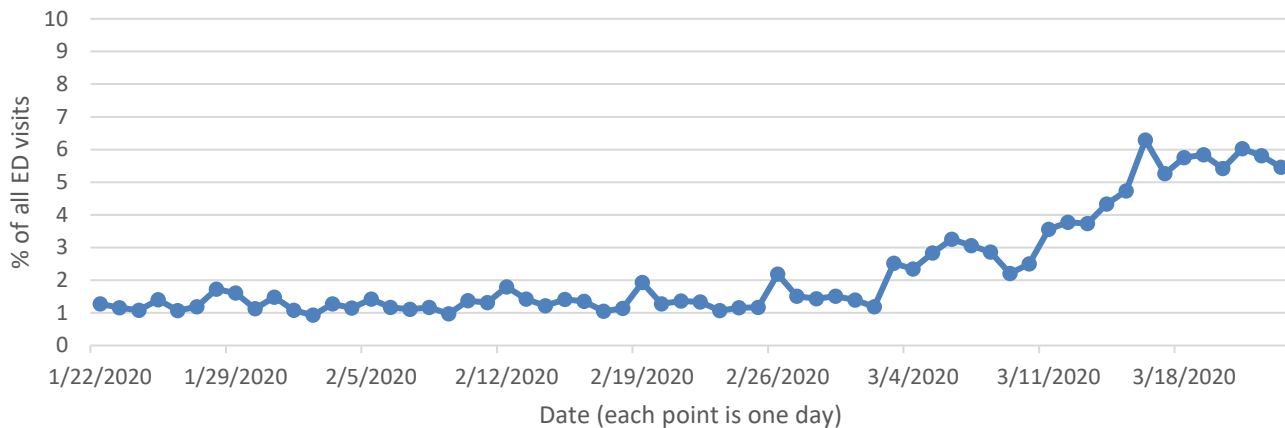
COVID-19 Cases by Symptom Onset Date and Hospitalization Status, Oregon, 2020
