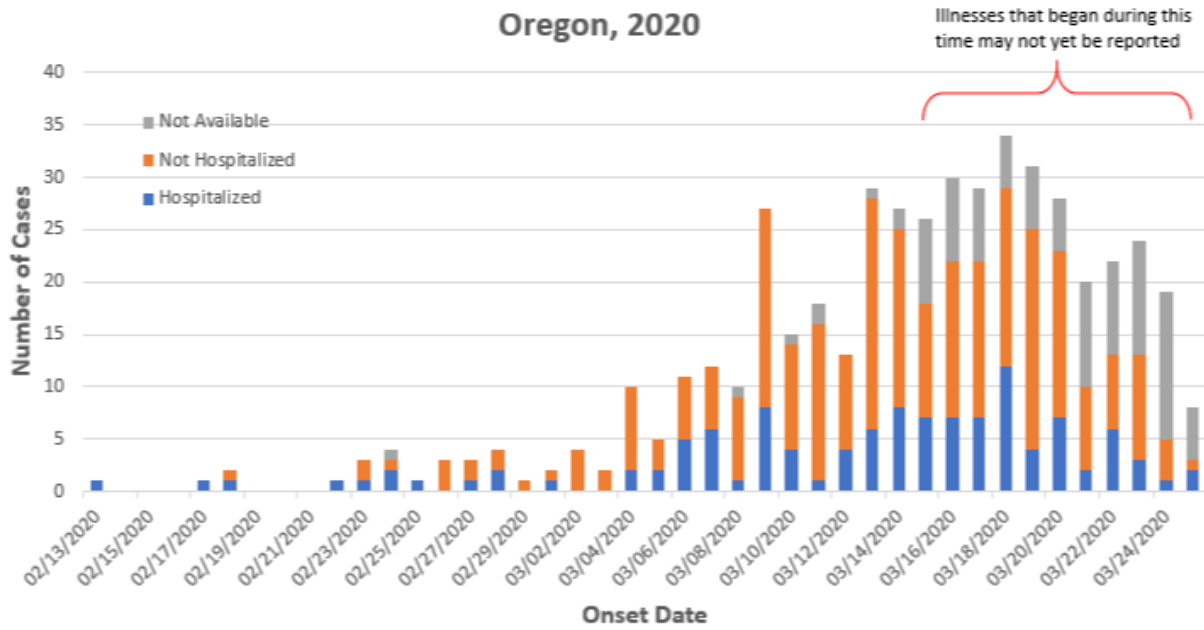

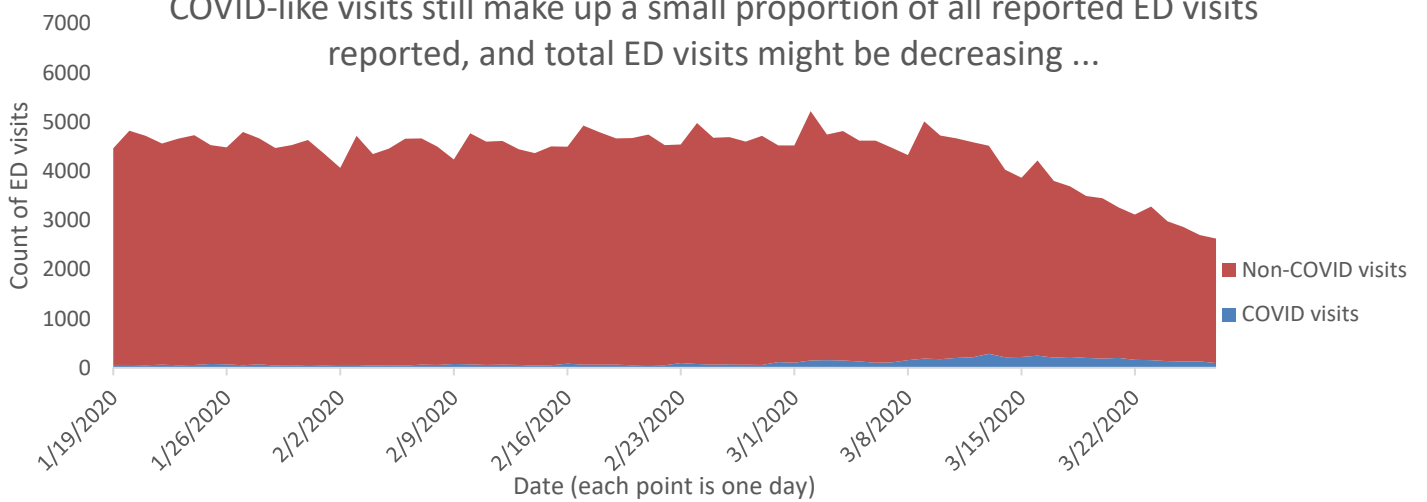

 - o 2002 total persons have been tested for COVID-19 at OSPHL since 2/28

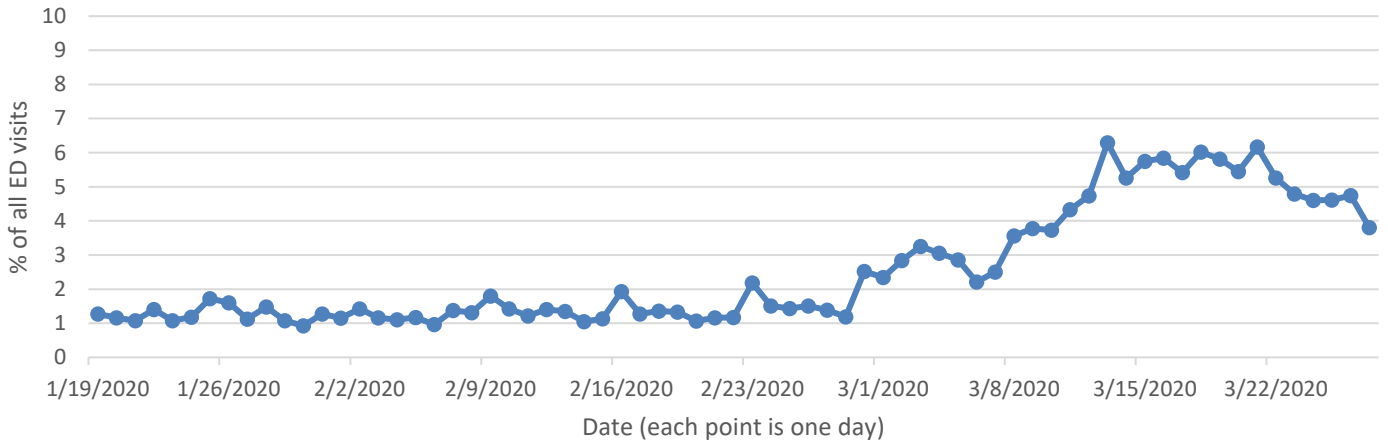
COVID-19 Cases by Symptom Onset Date and Hospitalization Status, Oregon, 2020
